A safer efficient South Arm road

South Arm Road will be upgraded from early January, to improve safety and efficiency. The Tasmanian company, Venarchie Contracting Pty Ltd, has won the contract worth almost \$850,000. The project involves shoulder widening for 2.2 kilometres between Lauderdale and Sandford, to help prevent cars driving into the gravel and losing control. The Infrastructure Minister, David O'Byrne, said it'll also improve junctions and provide right-hand-turn lanes at Forest Hill Road. "This is a busy road that connects several communities on Hobart's eastern shore," Mr O'Byrne said. "A strategic investment like this boosts safety and efficiency. "We're focussed on saving lives by investing in better roads, technology and driver education. "Every project we support through the Road Safety Levy is based on thorough research and the best evidence available," he said. The Government's already invested \$1.1 million widening road shoulders from Sandford to Cremorne. Motorists are urged to slow down through the area, and obey all road signs for safety reasons. The upgrades are expected to be finished by March.

'Avenue' of Red Flowering Gums

Have you noticed the different growth rates? I wonder what Jim is feeding his adopted trees! The trees that have been in about 3 years look particularly handsome coming into Opossum Bay now. Which will be the first to flower?

On a sadder note some people have neglected their little adopted trees. This is cruel weather folks, please give you tree regular water. A good soak with a bucket of water once a week (or a 2 litre bottle twice a week as a bar minimum) in this <u>very</u> dry weather. Don't forget to report to Richard (6239 9739) if there is a problem. You will need to make sure the water stays near the tree, so you can't just



pour and run. Perhaps it will need a little banking and a little weeding. Keep an eye out for snakes. The other day three volunteers spent 3.5 hours watering the neglected trees and they don't have the time to do that on a regular basis.

In Autumn we are planning to replace the trees that haven't survived. We are also trying to organise the continuation of the Red Flowering Gum 'avenue' between the South Arm Shop and the RSL and hope this can be done in Autumn too.

Cremorne was declared a town on 12 October 1959 although it had been settled long before that

when Sgt. James McCauley and his wife Maria were granted land sometime before 1819. The assembled residents then followed a piper through the village to the Beach Reserve for a long table lunch. As it was such a successful day the CCG intends to celebrate Cremorne's Proclamation Day annually. 

South Arm Fire Brigade

We are now in the middle the fire season and as we all know it's been a really bad one so far. The Brigade has provided crews to help with the Forcett fire,

working down at Eaglehawk Neck and Primrose Sands/ Dunalley.

During the busy bushfire season, fire danger ratings forecast for Tasmania will be available on the Bureau of Meteorology




website, the Tasmania Fire Service website and on the weather page of Tasmania's daily newspapers. You should listen for warnings on ABC Radio or check the TFS website at www.fire.tas.gov.au to find out where fires are burning. Power supplies and phones are very likely to fail in a bushfire. If power fails, listen to fire updates on your car radio.


During Fire Danger Levels of Catastrophic, Extreme, Severe, and Very High you should frequently check conditions outside your home. If smoke is blowing towards you, a fire is approaching and you should leave immediately by a safe route, away from the fire. TFS and Tasmania Police will do their very best to issue a warning if an evacuation is required, but wildfires can move very quickly so please don't wait for the official warning. If ash or burning embers are landing in your yard, the fire is very close and it may be too late to leave. If this is the case, take shelter in your home. Fill your bath and all available containers with water, and actively defend your home by using the water to put out any parts of your home that catch fire. Alternatively and if time allows, go immediately to a nearby safe place.

The Tasmanian Fire Service has a number of booklets/brochures to help you prepare, these are available via their website http://www.fire.tas.gov.au/Show?pageId=colPublications or by contacting the Brigade.

The Fire Permit season was declared just before Christmas.

A note of thanks to the community

Over the past week I have been overwhelmed by the generosity of the local community. A group of us have been busy collecting all your donations of money and goods, and organising their delivery to those who need them the most. I would like to take this opportunity to express my heart felt thanks to the community for the amazing generosity you have shown. I would also like to share with you where all your donations have flowed to. Our initial donation run was big enough to fill my entire seven seater car, with only room for myself - I could barely squeeze the camera in it was so full! We had everything from clothes, blankets and linen, to nonperishable foods, toiletries, baby accessories, and even a walking stick! There was also a combined sum of approximately \$200 collected in the local shops, which I duly took to the supermarket and spent on necessary supplies, including water, nappies, baby wipes, dog and cat food. I ran this lot into town where I'd arranged to meet up with some lovely people who intended to sail supplies to the Peninsula. Sid, Jodie, Kyran and Melanie loaded all your awesome donations onto their yacht and delivered your them to the Nubeena jetty that evening.

The next load of donations went out soon after. Cremorne became a temporary loading point for boats running supplies down to the Peninsula, and we ran the next load there. Donations of milk and ice from the Opossum Bay Store headed down with more supplies from our generous community - more blankets, a lot more food, more toiletries, a couple of slabs of beer, and a very generous serve of south arm grown potatoes were amongst the donations in this run. Wonderful volunteers unloaded my car, and these dedicated people stayed down at the jetty for hours co-ordinating supplies being loaded onto boats. But I had no time to hang around. I had another \$200 of generous donations from our local community to spend. This money, coupled with \$200 from the donation jar at BP Lauderdale, went to the Animal Tuckerbox in Mornington, where it was invested in much needed food supplies for poultry, sheep and rabbits, and some specifically requested first aid equipment for horses. Animal Tuckerbox offered a

discount (more bang for your buck) and were also running supplies out directly, so they organised the transport of this load.

Still not done with donating, the community filled my car yet again with food, toiletries and blankets, which were dropped off to the Foodbank in Cambridge, who are organising hampers and running them directly down to the Peninsula in their truck. Edward from the Foodbank was thrilled with your donation, and has also put out a call for volunteers. He says that as things quiet down, the need increases while the volunteers subside. I would urge you, if you have a spare afternoon, to go and give him a helping hand. They do a marvellous job.

We are, of course, still collecting. I will run your donations to wherever they need to go for as long as they are needed and for as long as our local community keep donating. The Foodbank, I understand, are in need of money to invest in generators, power boards and other expensive equipment that needs to be bought new, and, failing a more urgent need, this is where the next monetary donation will be delivered, as too will future food donations as the Peninsula opens and the urgency to deliver by boat subsides.

I cannot thank you all enough for everything you have done. With our small contribution, we chip in to make a big difference to the lives of people who have lost everything. I feel so incredibly proud to be Tasmanian, and especially proud to be part of the wonderful, generous and inspirational community of the South Arm Peninsula. Thank you everyone, and please...keep it coming!

History & Heritage

Some time ago I wrote about pinkeye potatoes being grown in South Arm around 1914, I have since read the story about the late Mr. George Alomes growing pinkeye's for the Hobart Market in December 1891. Some specimens he produced at the time weighing almost one pound each goes to show just how fertile the soil was then. On the passing of George Alomes the property passed to his sons Edward and Leslie. Later my mother and father who inherited the farm all continued the growing of pinkeye's plus several other varieties. By 1930-50 most if not all farmers in South Arm were growing pinkeye's. It reached the stage that the one freight carrier Mr. Vere Calvert was making two trips to Hobart on Tuesdays and Thursdays with Monday of each week set aside to take cattle and sheep etc. to the Sorell stock sale or to the Derwent Abettors. The demand for pinkeye's was so great some shop keepers would meet Mr. Calvert on arrival in town to take delivery prior to delivering to other firms. By so doing he was also setting an agreed price for the market otherwise the price was set when sold at auction. The pinkeye's were in such demand that some shop keepers would send their truck down to South Arm on Sunday afternoon to pick up a load and would have the vegetables on sail early Monday morning in Hobart. By 1945 several growers purchased their own trucks so as to supply the potatoes, lettuces, peas, & beans etc., so as to catch the early market in Hobart. Farmers started to try growing pinkeye's all the year round, there has been some success with this provided you had some elevated ground preferably on the side of a hill to get the early morning sun and beat the frosts in winter. Over the last few years we now see pinkeye's that are being grown in many areas of Tasmania. The ones I see in the big super markets now have the appearance they are being grown in very heavy black soil, these have that dark grey skin, whereas the South Arm grown pinkeye has that cream colour. If you see any with the entire skin rubbed look like they are peeling this is because they have been dug by a machine. I grew pinkeye's myself for some years and the shop keepers we supplied insisted that we do not leave any soil on the product and that they be covered when being delivered with the green tops to keep them fresh, potatoes at that time were sold in apple cases. These days the product is in cardboard boxes, we now see when opened in the shops there all covered in lots of sand, presentation seems to have been done away with. Watch for any sign of green appearing on the skin an indication they have been uncovered subject to much light, it is very important they be covered when stored for any period of time. Water is the important part of a successful crop being grown and not using the same ground each time, if you can avoid it. From past records of 1918-20 rain fall in South Arm was reported being so heavy that crops of peas, beans and hay being flattened to the ground, the apples, pears, peaches all dropping from the trees.

(Note) I have not had any feedback or suggestions for Spring Beach.

So early one morning when I saw the black blob in the distance my mind conjured up all sorts of wonderful things. Was it alive? It appeared to be moving. For quite some time as I walked towards it I was puzzled, but as I got close the 'movement' revealed itself to be black birds milling about. Eventually my looming presence worried them enough to take off and they did so in a line. First one, then another, and another, followed each other out close to the surface of the water. The black blob slowly unravelled off the beach into a thin line of birds, it looked like a ball of black wool being undone. Finally they formed a true v-shaped skein. A check in my bird book later revealed them to be Little Black Cormorants and I saw them flying past quite a few times after that, nearly always in a skein.
