in the freezer! Old Sid went on to explain that three canneries on the South Coast of NSW had closed down and because Salmon were no longer a commercially targeted species their numbers had got out of hand.

Sid was a wealth of knowledge and even pointed out that fish scales are a component of house paints "Hence the saying sticks like a scale to a blanket !" Sid roared.

As to other species he has only ever caught three flathead off the beach in forty years of fishing Nine Mile Beach Forster. They don't get in close he said but if you fish from a boat wide of the surf you will catch plenty. As for preparing Blackback Salmon, Sid says to keep them in the fridge overnight with the scales on then fillet them the next day. He also said a medium sized fish is the best tasting.

Ah, there's nothing like the joy and knowledge to be found from an old "Fisho".

Clarence Cultural Heritage Advisory Committee (CCHAC)

Alan Townsend from the Council advised that in 2009 Clarence Council adopted a history plan to support history groups' collections, to record and publish local history, to encourage historical events and to install historical and interpretative signs.

Currently the Advisory Committee is concentrating on two fronts:

- 1. They are setting up a central database of historical photographic collections in Clarence. Photos are to be scanned and the people in them identified before we lose that information. Hopefully Hunting for Silver on Hope Beach

Some time ago you may remember a story in this Newsletter about the missing silver coins from the wreck of the *Hope*. The *Hope* was wrecked in 1827 on what is now Hope beach.

Many people have searched for the coins over the years and there are many theories as to why they have never been found. There was a very good article in the Sunday Tasmanian on the 3rd of July 2011 entitled "Lost booty stolen by rich whaler". The theory in this article may possibly have solved the riddle.

The money was supposed to have been shipped to Tasmania to pay the garrison in Hobart Town. Of course many have said that the money was never on the *Hope* in the first place and I have not seen or read anything about an inquiry into the disappearance of the money since that time.

The older residents of South Arm who are no longer with us spoke about how many people came and searched the shores along Hope Beach without any luck. My father, Bill Potter, knew several of these folk who spent days digging hoping to strike it lucky. So my feeling is that the story in the Sunday paper is much closer to the truth. Who knows?

Diabetes

The 10th-16th July 2011 was National Diabetes week. Diabetes is a chronic disease affecting an estimated 1.7 million Australians. About 275 adults develop diabetes every day which puts them at risk of serious health problems like blindness, stroke, heart disease, and kidney damage. You can however prevent, delay or manage type 2 diabetes

successfully.

Vitamin D – John Bell

Most people are well aware of the important role vitamin D plays in helping the body absorb calcium – necessary for the development of healthy bones, muscles and teeth – but scientists are now suggesting that vitamin D and calcium may be involved in a wide range of diseases and disorders such as diabetes, heart disease, various cancers (breast, colon and prostate), skin conditions, multiple sclerosis and depression.

Recent studies have indicated that vitamin D insufficiency may be an "unrecognised epidemic" with up to 25% of Australians being vitamin D deficient, and a significantly higher number of Tasmanians affected.

It's almost impossible to obtain enough vitamin D from food; we get around 90% of our vitamin D from exposure to the sun. But, it's important to strike a balance between sufficient sun exposure for adequate vitamin D production and minimising the risk of skin cancer. In most parts of Australia – "tank top" (face, hands and arms) exposure for 10 minutes, three or four times a week during the spring and summer months, is ample time.

People at risk of vitamin D deficiency include housebound or bedridden elderly people, those who live in aged-care facilities, those who wear concealing clothing for religious or cultural reasons, who have dark skin, who are obese, and breastfed babies, especially if their mothers have a vitamin D deficiency.

While routine vitamin D supplementation is not recommended for most adults in Australia, a daily supplement should be recommended for at-risk adults. Your doctor can give you a simple blood test to determine whether or not you are deficient in vitamin D.
